FARA updated partners on a joint initiative between the European Union and the African Union to promote sustainable agriculture during its General Assembly this week.

ASARECA and CABI sign MoU to Strengthen Agricultural Research for **Development:** ASARECA and CABI have signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) that will enable the two organisations to jointly work towards promoting their shared objectives and areas of strategic focus in Eastern and Central Africa. The MoU formalises and strengthens a long-standing partnership that has existed for over two decades, with each of the organisations individually or collectively contributing to research for numerous agricultural development initiatives in the region.

Post-Harvest Loss Management – A Viable Alternative for Food and Nutrition Security in Sub-Saharan Africa: Reducing post-harvest losses through effective loss management strategies is a viable strategy to improving food security and nutrition in Africa. Despite Africa's huge agricultural potential including vast fertile arable lands, growing diverse population, increasing demand for food and a vibrant young population, over 200 million people in Sub-Sahara Africa continue to live in poverty and suffer from food and nutrition

induced losses of topsoil and soil nutrients. Restoring and rehabilitating the health of soil in Africa is a viable intervention towards promoting food security in the region. Despite Africa's vast land resources, less than half of it is currently utilized for agriculture with only 16 percent of the arable land considered as high quality.
