Food systems gone crazy?

Even before COVID-19 unleashed itself on the globe, the world had swerved off course to meet its target of zero hunger by 2030. Hunger is increasing, while nutritious food remains out of reach for many of the world's poorest. Figures from a multi-agency UN report show that global food insecurity rose as much last year as in the previous five combined. The number undernourished people increased by as many as 161 million, reaching up to 811 million - or around ten per cent of the world's population.
